



Best known for his general theory of relativity and the famous equation linking mass and energy, $E = mc^2$, Albert Einstein had a lasting impact on the world of science, the extent of which is illuminated along with his fascinating life and unique personality—in this lively history. Alexander Graham Bell led a fascinating life. He was an immigrant, an inventor, a pioneering speech teacher, and a champion of educating the hearing impaired. Bell was raised by a mother who had nearly no hearing, married a deaf woman, and was lifelong friends with Helen Keller. Few people realize that Bell considered his work with the deaf the most important of his life. Quite a statement, considering Bell's inventions ranged from telephony and phonographs to airplanes and hydrofoil boats!

Few remember that Bell was called to the bedside of fatally shot President Garfield in 1881 to use his newly-invented "telephonic probe" metal detector in the search for the embedded bullet. Seized by the Sun introduces teens to the remarkable life of Gertrude "Tommy" Tompkins, who overcame a debilitating childhood stutter and a repressive family life; the loss of her one true love to air combat and then an essentially forced marriage; and the social, cultural, and gender barriers of her time to find her passion in flying. She became one of 126 elite women chosen to pilot World War II fighter planes for the Women's Airforce Service Pilots (WASPs). Scheduled to move a P-51 Mustang from California to New Jersey, where it would be shipped to Great Britain, Tompkins departed Mines Field at 4:00 PM but never arrived at her destination. No crash site was ever found. Her



disappearance remains a mystery, and Ure describes the movement of aviation enthusiasts and historians who continue to search for her wreck and remains in the mountains and offshore waters of Southern California. Based on interviews with Tompkins's family and close friends, with WASPs and other flyers, and on the Tompkins family files, letters, and collected military documents, *Seized by the Sun* is an invaluable addition to any student's or history buff's bookshelf.

Frederick Douglass dismissed Myrtilla's plan to open a school for African American girls in the slaveholding South as "reckless, almost to the point of madness." But Myrtilla Miner, the daughter of poor white farmers in Madison County, New York, was relentless. Fueled by an unyielding feminist conviction, and against a tide of hostility, on December 3, 1851, the fiery educator and abolitionist opened the School for Colored Girls-the only school in Washington D.C. dedicated to training African American students to be teachers. Although often in poor health, Myrtilla was a fierce advocate for her school, fending off numerous attacks including stonings, arson, and physical threats, and discouraged local "rowdies" by brandishing her revolver with open displays of target practice. The school would gradually gain national fame and stimulate a nationwide debate on the education of black people. Myrtilla's School for Colored Girls would slowly flourish through the years and exists even today as part of the University of the District of Columbia. The only daughter of a working-class Swedish immigrant and his wife, this everyday girl describes her life growing up in the city—from pining for handsome boys in ROTC uniforms and bus trips between the Art Institute and her home to her love of Lake Michigan and, later, her campus life at the University of Chicago. Along the way she ruminates about the daily headlines and major touchstones of the era: the Lindbergh kidnapping, FDR on the radio, *Goodbye Mr. Chips* and *Citizen Kane*, Garbo, Churchill, Hitler, war work, and Red Cross meetings. Poems, doodles, and drawings of the latest dress, outfit, or haircut accompany the entries. The diary is an entertaining and delightful read as well as a vivid account of a real American girl's lived experiences.
