Judith, Quincy, and Rosemarie Kratt once had the run of their small textile town of Bound, South Carolina. Their father owned Kratt Mercantile Company, a four story brick department store on Main Street where Daddy Kratt could sell a man a shoehorn and a chicken as though they were a matching set. Judith managed the store inventory and led occasional tours of the property, while Quincy bartered in town gossip, buying and selling secrets to ingratiate himself to their father. Rosemarie was the town beauty.

All of that changed on one fateful evening in 1929, when Quincy paid the ultimate price for a secret too consequential to stay hidden for long—and when Rosemarie fled the town, never to be seen again.

Never to be seen again, that is, until now.

Decades later, Judith and Olva—a black woman who has lived with the Kratts since childhood, occupying the unsettling space between family member and one of the "help"—have built a quiet, uneventful existence for themselves on the grounds of the formerly elegant Kratt family estate. When Judith receives a postcard from Rosemarie that reads only, "Sister, I am coming home," she knows that existence is about to be upended. In an anxious attempt to retain some semblance of control over the house and its histories, she begins writing an inventory of the Kratt family heirlooms, from the Tiffany lamp that heralded the arrival of electricity in Bound to the Purdey shotgun that Quincy inherited just days before his death. But the truth Rosemarie seems determined to finally tell threatens everything about life as Judith has known it—and threatens to expose the lifetime of secrets that she and Olva had hoped to take to their graves.

THE LAST LIST OF MISS JUDITH KRATT recalls the lyricism, dark family secrets, and suspenseful storytelling of Wiley Cash's *The Land More Kind Than Home* and of M.O. A novel about marriage, love and sexuality, CAPE MAY explores what happens to a young couple when they meet a group of debauched cosmopolitans on their honeymoon, and the repercussions that meeting has on the rest of their marriage.

It's 1957, and Henry and Effie, newlyweds from Georgia, arrive in Cape May, New Jersey, for their honeymoon. It's October, though, and the town is deserted. Feeling shy of each other and alone, they decide to cut the trip short. But before they leave, they meet a glamorous set of people who sweep them up into their drama and eventually upend their marriage. There's Clara, a beautiful socialite who feels her youth slipping away; Max, a wealthy playboy and Clara's lover; and Alma, Max's aloof and mysterious half-sister, to whom Henry is irresistibly drawn. The empty town becomes the characters' playground, and as they sneak into abandoned summer homes, go sailing, walk naked under the stars, make love, and drink a great deal of gin, Henry and Effie slip from innocence into betrayal, with consequences that reverberate through the rest of their lives.

In CAPE MAY, Cheek mingles a lyric eroticism reminiscent of James Salter's A SPORT AND A PASTIME with themes similar to Susan Minot's EVENING—filtered through a cool, at times humorous, sensibility that may remind readers of Ian McEwan or Colm Toibin.

THE GLASS HOTEL follows the interconnected lives of a number of people caught up in one or both events: Vincent Miller, Nicole's closest friend, who finds herself in a surreal new life as the trophy wife of Jonathan Alkaitis, the mastermind behind the Ponzi scheme, in the last few years before his arrest; Leon Prevant, a shipping executive who's tasked with overseeing an internal investigation into Nicole's disappearance and becomes one of the Ponzi scheme's last investors; the deeply compromised and increasingly desperate office staff who carry out the day-to-day administration of the Ponzi; and Alkaitis himself.

Broadly speaking, the book is concerned with money, white-collar crime, the merchant navy, beauty as currency, ghosts, and moral compromise. If Rigby is going to pull this one out, he'll need to negotiate a whole cast of players with their own agendas: his wife Paula, his mistress (and law partner's widow) Beth, Paula's new golf pro plaything, an embittered art forger, Glenn's resentful nurse Nina and his bankrupt nephew Jerry. Part crime thriller, part ensemble farce, THAT LEFT TURN AT ALBUQUERQUE is a return for noir master Scott Phillips: a hardboiled valentine to the Golden State. Written with the hard-knock sensibility and wicked humor of his early crime novels, his latest will not only appeal to readers of Don Winslow, James Ellroy and Michael Connelly, but cement Scott as one of the great crime writers of the 21st century.

Scott Phillips is a screenwriter, photographer and the author of seven novels and numerous short stories. His bestselling debut novel, *The Ice Harvest* (Ballantine, 2000), was a *New York Times* Notable Book and was adapted as a major motion picture starring John Cusack and Billy Bob Thornton. November 9th, 2016: Donald Trump is president, and a flip has switched. America is newly invested in politics, and many are re-interrogating what it means to be a citizen of democracy, as they ponder how to respond to Trump. We have been taught to understand the American project as a done deal, and politics as a spectator sport rather than as a system to be actively engaged with. This widespread alienation is especially prevalent among young people.

Millennials' lack of political engagement is accepted as a truism, but low voter turnout statistics don't tell the full story. Young people are more likely to work outside of the system, fighting to change the world in non-traditional ways. They volunteer more than previous generations, and use their digital nativism for innovative means of community rallying and organization. The problem is not that they don't care, but that they are denied access to the pipelines of civic engagement at an institutional level. They feel alienated from a system that actively seeks to alienate them.

There is much talk of millennial stereotypes, but in addition to a penchant for selfies, their shared traits include a massive amount of energy and potential. We see this quite clearly in internet fandom culture. There is a huge amount of time, creativity, and innovation executed online. Young people comprise a valuable untapped resource for political action, and Trump's election has awakened the possibility for a re-democratization beginning with the millennial generation. That means rethinking the core requirements of citizenship, beginning with more young people integrating civic engagement into their lives, and escalating to the ultimate act of democratic participation: running for office.

Just as his music career was taking off, Juan Vidal received life-changing news: he'd soon be a father. It's during those pivotal years that he's drawn to the counterculture—skateboarding, graffiti, and the music of rebellion: hip-hop. As he looks to the past for answers, he infuses his personal story with rap lyrics and interviews with some of pop culture's most compelling voices—of which plenty have proven to be some of society's best, albeit non-traditional, dads. Along the way, Vidal confronts the unfair stereotypes that taint urban men—especially Black and Latino men—in today's society.

An illuminating journey of discovery, RAP DAD is a striking portrait of modern fatherhood that is as much political as it is entertaining, personal as it is representative, and challenging as it is revealing.
